Return to Honduras (\$1,500)

The grant enables the opportunity to revisit a successful former ZEF grant project. In February of 2007, ZEF graciously sent the teacher to Honduras (Central America) to work and learn within small, rural Honduran elementary, middle and high schools for one week. This 2015 grant enables the teacher to return to these 6 schools to observe, teach, and connect with the educators and students. These connections would further improve the teaching expertise and level of Spanish.
